### Fish if you wish

We get lots of inquiries about fishing. The clear waters of Lake of Two Rivers boast an abundance of trout and bass, and both novice and experienced fishers can reap the benefits.

More than 50 species of fish have been recorded in Algonquin Park, which is known worldwide for Brook and Lake Trout. Lake Trout are the larger of the two, measuring 12 to 30 inches and weighing between two and ten pounds. The largest Lake Trout recorded in Ontario was a whopping 63 pounds!

Spring is the best time for fishing, with the season beginning in late April. Fishing permits can be obtained at the park's East \_\_\_\_\_ and West gates.

So bring your rods and tackle (but not live bait), or rent from an outfitting store before you arrive, and enjoy a peaceful morning fishing on Lake on Two Rivers.

Guests commented on how rare it is to see a phone booth these days. Younger guests regarded it with awe, many of them having never seen one.


Although it's been out of service, people liked to take pictures with it or pretend to dial, just to remember how it felt.

Drink up!


### Breaking new trail

The Friends of Algonquin Park, a Cana<sup>-</sup> dian charity, is fundraising to help construct a new trail - the first in over 20 years!

The park has 18 interpretive walking trails, most just a short drive from Killarney Lodge. The newest one is Big Pines, constructed in 2001, which visits an 1880s lumber camp and old-growth white pines.

Your stay at the Lodge includes a park permit, so guests can visit any trails. Take a quick trip around the Spruce Bog Trail in the morning, or order a picnic and spend the day tackling Centennial Ridges.

The location of the new trail is being kept under wraps for now. To help build it, you can donate at the Algonquin Park Visitor Centre or online at the Friends of Algonquin website.
